

National Showcase By: Nancy Ellis Riggs

National Showcase: A Competition in Theatrical Skating was held August 5-7 on Cape Cod, Massachusetts. I represented the Atlanta FSC, along with Ariel Collins, Helena Fisher, and Angela Smith. The competition is a little different from most that you might attend. As you can guess, all of the events are showcase or interpretive types of events.



The categories are dramatic, light, duet and extemporaneous. Skaters are further divided by age and/or level. There is also a competition for mini productions and production ensembles. In order to qualify, you must place fourth or better in one of these events during the competitive season.

The main difference for the skaters is the spotlights! You do have an opportunity to practice with the spotlights. I was assigned a session the afternoon I flew into Boston. I arrived at the rink in Hyannis in time to put on my skates and get on the ice! Next time, I will wear workout clothes on the plane. The lights make it a bit difficult to tell how much room you have. I did see one skater in the competition run into the wall; I was glad that I wasn't wearing my monkey mask (I chose my scarecrow program). Another difference is that there is a curtain blocking off one end of the ice, so you have about 20% less ice (not a problem for me). The space behind the curtain is also your only warm-up space, except in the extemporaneous event.

The extemporaneous event was exciting for me, because I had never done one, since none of our local competitions have this event for adults. (If you qualify in one category, you may also compete in others). Our music was a Kelly Clarkson ballad I'd never heard, but I managed to be expressive enough to win, which qualified me for the Parade of Extemporaneous Champions - a final round of the winners from all the levels, from preliminary to senior and adults. I was a bit outgunned! I improvised a comic "pairs" routine with a small raccoon puppet I had in my bag to the tango music from Moulin Rouge and got a lot of laughs. The biggest thrill was meeting Olympic champion Tenley Albright afterwards.

It was fun just to watch so many inventive, expressive and entertaining programs from skaters of various ages and abilities. Next time you qualify, I recommend that you go!

U.S. Figure Skating To Offer Online Store Discounts, Gold Medal Jacket for Successful Testing

U.S. Figure Skating recently introduced a new recognition program for successful testing. Once a passed test is registered by the test chair, a congratulatory e-mail will be sent to the athlete from U.S. Figure Skating President Patricia St. Peter. The message will also invite the recipient to complete an online questionnaire about his or her participation in figure skating.



After completing the survey, the skater will receive a coupon code for a discount to the U.S. Figure Skating Online Store. The discount will start at 10 percent off for skaters passing prepreliminary through pre-juvenile/pre-bronze and will increase for higher tests, with athletes passing a senior or gold test receiving 40 percent off.

U.S. Figure Skating has also created a Gold Medalist jacket (pictured) that can be purchased through the online store by anyone who has passed the senior or gold test. Athletes passing the test after July 1, 2010, may use their 40 percent off reward toward the purchase of a Gold Medalist jacket. The jackets can be purchased

Valuable Volunteers & Opportunities

One of the reasons the Atlanta FSC enjoys a strong reputation within the skating community is the effort of our talented and dedicated pool of volunteers. The club invites all parents and adult members to join the fun and help create a memorable year for our enthusiastic skaters by

contributing service hours.

DID YOU KNOW?

Because the AFSC is a non-profit organization, all club-sponsored events are staffed <u>100%</u> by volunteers. Even our outstanding pool of judges is voluntary. We need your help for competitions, test sessions, club ice, special events, exhibitions, parties, consignment sales, and communications.

Therefore, all families who have <u>Full, Newcomer, Test, or Adult Skating Members</u> are asked to donate a minimum of four (4) hours of service by an adult (18 years+). Other membership categories are encouraged to volunteer, although not required.

Teams have been formed confirming your service area (as indicated on the Volunteer Team Form). You are welcome to serve on more than one team and are encouraged to volunteer across multiple events. Volunteering sends a strong message to your skater that his/her participation in skating is valued.

WHY CONTRIBUTE MORE THAN FOUR?

The more hours you contribute, the more events the club can offer our skaters, thus maximizing fun and the value of membership! For example, this spring the Atlanta FSC is organizing an ice show for April 29 - May 1 that will showcase all of our skating members. We need plenty of volunteer assistance to help produce a high quality and enjoyable show.

In addition, the club is looking for highly motivated volunteers to fill various leadership roles within the club; in particular, we need area chairs for competitions. Mentors are available to assist and train.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR JUNIOR MEMBERS

Junior skating members who need community service hours for school (e.g., Beta Club, National Honor Society) or simply want to give back to the club may volunteer for certain positions at competitions and other events. (Note – these hours do not count toward the required 4-hour family minimum.) For example, at the Magnolia Open and Atlanta Open, older teens may volunteer to assist in registration, awards, ice monitors, music, set up, or lead runners. Younger teens and children may work as runners.

THE REWARDS OF VOLUNTEERING

Volunteering for the club is really fulfilling for me - I feel like I get closer to everyone in the skating community. From teaching the younger kids to announcing at competitions, I love helping out the Atlanta FSC on behalf of my school's Beta Club.

A couple of years ago when the club needed someone to serve as chair of runners, I had absolutely no clue about running a competition, but working together with other wonderful volunteers taught me a lot: you can learn more about the skating world, see the judges at work, feel the excitement, live the happy moments with successful skaters and offer a shoulder to cry on during the bad moments after a disappointing program. An open attitude and a big smile take you a long way in the learning process.

Being able to volunteer on different occasions has given me the opportunity to get to know the skaters and parents by name. It makes me and my family feel like home when we come to The Cooler to skate because it's like coming home to your other family - skating family. My adult "coffee club" morning public group has especially given me a lot of strength and hope that you can actually learn to skate as an adult!

For me volunteering is not counting the hours. Actually compared to many of the dance companies that require 60 hours annually, our 4 hour requirement is extremely reasonable. Sometimes those hours include freezing your butt counting minutes at the rink; sometimes it includes failing equipment and racing against time to fix the problem without anyone noticing. But every time it includes laughing with friends. I really have learned that the more you help out and get to know people, the more it helps you as a skater - and there is also just a nice little side effect: it also helps your club to become a better club! I recommend volunteering to everyone!


